



2018-2019 Accreditation Highlights

#### Caroline Moving in the Right Direction

On September 27, 2018 the Virginia Department of Education released accreditation results for schools across the Commonwealth. Caroline County Public Schools celebrates an increase in school accreditation with 4 out of 5 CCPS schools accredited and one school accredited with conditions

Caroline County Public Schools has a lot to celebrate based on the 17-18 SOL results. All buildings met with success in the academic achievement indicators of math and science. In the area of mathematics, the three elementary schools all scored over 82%, while Caroline Middle and Caroline High School exceeded the state target. All schools demonstrated success in science by exceeding the state target.

In the 2018-19 school year, students with disabilities and chronic absenteeism will be a division focus. Each school has crafted a School Wide Plan that address specific areas of growth in each content area. The individualized School Wide Plans will encompass student specific goals, strategies, and assessment tools to drive quality instruction and enhance student achievement. Collaborative efforts between the central office team and school leadership will allow CCPS to progress monitor growth and provide the professional development needed for continue success.

# SPECIAL EDUCATION

From the Desk of Lora Glass





The fall equinox has occurred and autumn has arrived! Football season is in the air.

September is the time to reflect on our progress over the last year. On the heals of positive accreditation reports, the Department of Special Education has successes to share. Students who participate in the Virginia Alternate Assessment Program (SOL) received an overall pass rate of 95.4% and 91.8% of the participants were recognized as members of the Perfect Score Club at the School Board meeting. These score are worthy of applause for both the teachers and the students. In addition to recognizing our current students, we recognize the successes of our graduates. As captured in Indicator 14, 75% of the special education students who graduated in 2017 are enrolled in high education and training or employed. This statistic exceeds the state target. Way to go graduates! In addition, CCPS showed growth in the attainment of advanced and standard diplomas and the referral to community agencies for continued support after graduation from high school.

Professional development opportunities for special education included training on Section 504 responsibilities and positive practices, eligibility deadline requirements and Mandt training. Fall VCASE was held in September and the theme of this year's conference was "Improving Student Outcomes: Addressing the Impact of Trauma and Mental Health Needs in Schools." While data presented by UVA's Dewey Cornell supported that schools are very safe places. VDOE and additional speakers presented on topics to continually support our students who experience risk factors and stressors in their personal lives as well as on strategies to support our faculty and staff working with these students. Caroline County has formed a Mental Health focus group which is using department plans and the strategic plan (Pathways 2022) to guide our implementation of supports within our schools.

It was a soggy kick-off to our Special Education Advisory Council (SEAC) which was forced to cancel our September meeting due to rain and hurricane warnings. Our next meeting is scheduled for November 19 at 4:30 at the Parent Teacher Resource Center. All are welcome to attend and the primary focus will be on continued improvement of special education services for our students.





# TESTING

As we slowly move into fall, students have completed some key assessment measures. CHS just completed first quarter benchmarks and midterms. Eleventh grade students enrolled in EOC Reading will complete the writing multiple choice and short paper tests in mid-October. Also coming soon, October 10 is the date of the PSAT 8/9 and PSAT/NMSQT for all eighth, ninth and tenth graders at CMS and CHS.

Both elementary and middle school students are preparing for their upcoming benchmarks in reading, math, science, and history. The fall benchmark for STAR, a computer-adaptive test for reading and math, was given in early September. Kindergarten teachers began administering the PALS assessment which is a phonemic awareness tool mandated by the state. Prior to giving PALS, students were assessed using the VKRP. The Virginia Kindergarten Readiness Program is a state assessment which measures math readiness and socio-emotional learning. Next year, all districts in the Commonwealth are mandated to give this screening tool by the General Assembly. In addition to national, state and district measures, teachers have been using formative and summative options in their classroom to assess both teaching and learning.

**Champion Zone Kids** (CZK) is a student organization that supports efforts to decrease student conflict and bullying behaviors **developed by bus drivers Dawn Hawkins and Shyla Sale**. Champion Zone Kids provides the opportunity to support efforts by Caroline Middle School by partnering with students, families and the school to be a part of the solution working together to educate and eliminate student conflict and bullying.

According to Stopbullying.org, conclusive research has shown that between 1 in 4 U.S. students say they have been bullied or experienced cyberbullying. Research also showed that most bullying happens during the middle school years with the most common types being verbal and social bullying. Furthermore, school staff can do a great deal to prevent bullying and protect students, but they can't do it alone. Parents and youth also have a role to play in preventing bullying at school. When parents and youth are involved in the solutions and partner with schools:

- ⇒ Students feel safer and can focus on learning.
- ⇒ Parents worry less.
- ⇒ Teachers and staff can focus on their work.
- ⇒ Schools can develop more responsive solutions because students are more likely to see or hear about bullying than adults.
- ⇒ School climate improves because students are engaged in taking action to stop bullying.
- ⇒ Parents can support schools' messages about bullying at home.



With this knowledge, and the knowledge of efforts already in place at C.M.S. two of our Caroline County Bus Drivers, Dawn Hawkins and Shyla Sale, reached strengthen efforts at the middle school by creating Champion Zone Kids or CZK. Drivers were on deck during Open House and Back to School Night providing information to families about the program and most recently were at middle school lunches for student sign up to commit become a Champion Zone Kid. Champion Zone kids, respect themselves and others, choose positive influences, value the differences in others, speak with kindness and is courtesy, help those who experience conflict or bullying and include those who are left out. Still in the early implementation phases, Champion Zone Kids will become a student run organization in which students will learn how to promote positive behaviors to replace negativity where students know that a small act of kindness can start a chain reaction.

Finance staff has finalized the Annual School Report and submitted it to the Virginia Department of Education. This report is a very detailed report of the schools districts revenues and expenditures. CCPS spent 74% of the \$45M spent in FY18 in the Instruction/Technology Classroom Instruction categories.

The school district's actual expenditures and revenues have been reconciled with the county up through May and we are currently working on June as a preliminary based on receiving preliminary reports from the county for the month of June at this time. We hope to receive finalized reports from the county shortly in order to finalize our reconciliations with them for FY18.

The financial auditors will return to CCPS the week of October 8, 2018 and we will be working with them for them to complete the final field work on the FY18 year.

FY20 Budget development season has come upon us very quickly and we will begin on working on the FY20 Budget as soon as we complete the FY18 financial audit. Thank you to all those who have expressed interest in serving on the Budget Advisory Committee this year. We look forward to working with the committee as we develop and present the budget for the coming year.
